

My Home District:

The name of my district is Blair's Cove, Durns Bentley, to be exact. It simply got its name because a landlord whose name was Blair built the house and occupied about forty or fifty acres with it. Then he called it after his own name.

There are only two houses in the district namely Blair's Cove House and my home which is situated in a corner of the land.

Only four families occupy the district, no one is over seventy nor can any speak Irish.

The houses are all slated and are of modern structure. There are no ruins of any old houses to be seen now but I have heard that a house once stood opposite my home down by the sea-shore. It seems that they were poor people who in years later emigrated to America.

The land of the district is rather level, and where the house is built it is rather high up. About one fifth of it is marshy and this part of it is known as the "flat". It is grown over with rushes and "woodies".

Many people do not exist in Boornaherons as the greatest part of the land is barren and hilly and little of it is used for cultivation. There are a good many bogs in that division but they are fairly small. In Blashadoo the land is good but hilly, and there are not any woods growing in the district. There are two rivers, one of them is known as the Coonkeen river which is a boundary between Boornaherons and Blashadoo. There is not any name given to the other.

I am a native of Gearanach (contracted from Jaeranach meaning a small wooded glen, and min, a smooth level spot amid rough ground). This townland is situated in the parish of Durrow, in the West Division of West Barony. The family name most common is Sullivan, and the townland is inhabited by eight families and approximately thirty people.

The houses which are few, are composed, for the most part of mud and stone. They are all slated. But a few are now in ruins including a gran store, while some have been completely obliterated from the landscape. Many people have emigrated from the family heart to Australia and America.

Budding local poets have immortalized our townland in poem. e.g.

Oh! Durrow, you were often fêted,
In the good old days gone by.
And only for Mr Mac. Monaway
You should lie down and die.
His out to help industry
Give every man fair play;
His enterprising capitalist
